Goals for 2019–2023 by Area of Focus:



Demonstrate hands-on leadership by monitoring water quality challenges and directly implementing solutions.

Goal 1: Continue to gather and report comprehensive, high-integrity water quality data and analysis to residents, researchers, and state and local agencies.

Goal 2: Implement high-visibility restoration projects in the Baltimore region to demonstrate the benefits of green infrastructure for improving waterway health.

Goal 3: Work with landowners in the city and county to help them understand and undertake opportunities for restoration projects that could be installed on their properties to improve water quality in our region.



Advocate for leadership on water quality from the public, private, and nonprofit sectors.

Goal 1: Work with partners to improve stormwater remediation.

Goal 2: Encourage businesses and institutions to champion improved water quality and water policy.

Goal 3: Hold polluters accountable for the water pollution they cause.

Goal 1: Inform the public debate by advocating for transparency on public water and wastewater spending and programs.

Goal 2: Increase public understanding of the primary sources of water pollution and where stormwater goes in the Baltimore region.

Goal 3: Empower Baltimore region residents to help improve waterway health by explaining simple and impactful actions they can take.
